BRIDGE AT ST. ALBANS HELD UP INDEFINITELY

Construction Will be Deferred by State Commission Because of Unfavorable Survey of Traffic; Purchase of Cabin Creek Span Also May Fall Through

The indefinite postponement of the construction of a bridge across the Kanawha river at St. Albans was announced Wednesday by the state bridge commission. Concurrently, A. C. Kimpel, commission secretary, disclosed that the purchase by the state of the bridge across the river at Cabin Creek was contingent upon the erection of the St. Albans bridge and that the former project may fall through.

Several of the stockholders in the Cabin Creek bridge also hold stock in the company from which the Cabin Creek bridge also hold stock in the company from which the commission had purchased the rights and franchise for the St. Albans bridge, Mr. Kimpel said. Sale of the former bridge was contingent upon the construction of the one at St. Albans. The commission now is endeavoring to complete its purchase of the Cabin Creek bridge, he added.

Backers Noified

The letter, addressed to W. L. Lynch, E. C. Colcord, J. C. Blackwood, J. V. R. Skinner, all of St. Albans, is:

"With the utmost regret on the part of the stae bridge commission. I am wriing to advise you that the project for the construction of a bridge at St. Albans, which we have had under consideration, has been indefinitely postponed.

"As you know, we entered into a continget contract to purchase the property and rights on the owners of the franchise for this bridge, the contingency being that the commission could finance the project. Our efforts to do this financing were, in turn, contingent upo a ew traffic survey covering the proposed bridge. This new traffic survey has been made and is such that the bankers bidding on the bonds have declined to do the financing. The commission is, therefore, forced, much tits regret, to defer the construction of the St. Albans bridge.

"It is our hope that the next legislature will so amend the present bridge act as to permit the general pooling of bridges over the entire state and that it may then be possible for us to take up the St. Albans-Nitro bridge project."
